## Comprehensive Safety Analysis 2010

Comprehensive Safety Analysis 2010 (CSA 2010) is a new system being implemented by the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration to try to lower the number of motor carrier-related crashes, injuries, and fatalities.

The system introduces a new compliance and enforcement model for the FMCSA to use when informing motor carriers of infractions they have incurred.

The new model is based around seven Behavior Analysis Safety Improvement Categories (BASICs), which are Unsafe Driving, Fatigued Driving, Driver Fitness, Controlled Substances/Alcohol, Vehicle Maintenance, Cargo-Related, and Crash Indicator.

The measurement for each BASIC is dependent upon the number of incidences, the severity of the violation, and

when the event occurred.

FMCSA has stated that this new model will be fully in place by November 2010. However, "from April 12- November 30, 2010 motor carriers can preview their own data by seeing their roadside inspections/ violations and crash events organized by Behavior Analysis and Safety Improvement Category (BASIC)."

Starting this fall, FMCSA will begin to mail letters to Carriers warning them of any deficient BASIC scores they have. Beginning August 16, 2010, Carriers will be able to view their performance in each of the BASICs.

It is highly recommended that Carriers utilize the system early to ensure that they can access the system, that the information listed is correct, and that they have time to improve any deficiencies listed.

Also keep in mind that depending on the severity of the infraction, an on-site inspection may occur, which does not require a warning letter to be sent beforehand.

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## 2010 UCR Update

As of April 27, the 2010 UCR has been available to file. States were given a suggested enforcement date of July 15, 2010

At this point, it is very important that all carriers, brokers, and freight forwarders complete this required filing to avoid fines.

DOT officers are imposing roadside enforcement and many states have implemented UCR enforcement penalties for those who are not regis-

tered. These penalties vary from state to state.

The more severe penalties include \$1100 for a first offense in CO, up to \$1000 for first offense in KS, \$1000 fine in NC, up to \$2000 per day in MO, up to \$1000 fine in WV, and \$750 fine in WI.

While not all states impose fines for failure to file UCR, several states will block carriers from other filings until the UCR is up to date. In KY, you may not file for a KYU until

UCR is current, overweight/over-length permits are not available in AK if no UCR is filed, and UT carriers are locked out of the state online permitting system until UCR fees are paid.

### **Current Diesel Prices**

After consistently rising over the past few weeks, diesel prices rose by the biggest margin in four months.

They increased by 6.3 cents to a national average of \$2.991 gallon. per Last week's price was 36.6 cents higher than the same week a year ago. The national average price for a gallon of gasoline also rose, up 4.3 cents. Gasoline prices have jumped three out of the four previous

weeks.

Diesel prices are now just 13.2 cents below the year's highest prices,\$3.127, set during the week of May 10. These prices are compounded from a survey of approximately 350 fueling stations across the country. Continue to check in for the most accurate updates on monthly diesel prices.

### **Hours of Service Rules**

Property-Carrying CMV Drivers

**II-Hour Driving Limit** May drive a maximum of II hours after 10 consecutive

hours off duty. **14-Hour Limit** 

May not drive beyond the 14th May not drive after having consecutive hour after coming on duty, following 10 consecutive hours off duty. Off-duty time does not extend the 14hour period.

60/70-Hour On-Duty Limit 60/70-Hour On-Duty Limit

May not drive after 60/70 hours on duty in 7/8 consecutive days. A driver may restart a 7/8 consecutive day period after taking 34 or more consecutive hours off duty.

Sleeper Berth Provision

Drivers using the sleeper berth provision must take at least 8 consecutive hours in the sleeper berth, plus a separate 2 consecutive hours either in the sleeper berth, off duty, or any combination of

10-Hour Driving Limit May drive a maximum of 10 hours after 8 consecutive

hours off duty.

**15-Hour On-Duty Limit** 

been on duty for 15 hours, following 8 consecutive hours off duty. Off-duty time is not included in the 15-hour period.

May not drive after 60/70 hours on duty in 7/8 consecutive days.

**Sleeper Berth Provision** 

Drivers using a sleeper berth must take at least 8 hours in the sleeper berth, and may split the sleeper-berth time into two periods provided neither is less than 2 hours.



### **Distracted Driver Summit**

On July 27<sup>th</sup>, Department of Transportation Secretary announced the second annual Distracted Driver Summit. This year's event will be September 21, 2010 in Washington, D.C. The summit will include "leading transportation officials, safety advocates, law enforcement, industry representatives, researchers, and victims affected by distraction-related crashes [addressing]

challenges and identify[ing] opportunities for national anti-distracted driving efforts."

After the first summit last fall, President Obama initiated a Executive Order banning text messaging by government employees using government-issued vehicles, government-issued mobile devices, or while on official government business.

For 2010, the purpose of the summit will be to recap the success following last year's summit, as well as the issues still needed to be tackled. "Key topics will include research, technology, policy, public outreach, and best practices in enforcement." The website, <a href="https://www.distraction.gov">www.distraction.gov</a> was created after last year's summit to better inform the public on the perils of distracted driving.
